De Leo and Heboyan Secure Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Grant

Dr. Gianluca De Leo (PI) and Dr. Vahe Heboyan (CO-I) were recently awarded a \$548,000 grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) in collaboration with Hack Augusta Inc., a business and idea incubator in downtown Augusta. The grant will be used to create a mesh network among small and midsize communities in Georgia to improve collaboration on public health innovation. This study is timely in that it is synergistic with the rural health initiative at Augusta University. The grant will also fund the development of an online certificate program in public health innovation and small business management. Obtaining a grant from the RWJF is no small feat. This announcement of the degree program is very timely as the Board of Regents just released guidance regarding the phasing out of the "Pre-health" programs in the University system. I am very proud of our College and all of the work we have done to establish the BSHS response to this challenge. We particularly appreciate the great work of the Department of Clinical and Digital Health Sciences, the entire BSHS design team and Lester Pretlow Associate Dean. Research Awards for FY2017 Set to Outpace FY2016

It appears that 2017 research dollars in the College of Allied Health Sciences are on pace to exceed those of FY2016. For the year end 2016, research submissions totaled \$21,568,527 with awards from the submissions totaling \$355,619. As of the 2nd quarter of FY2017 our research submissions total \$18,475,590 while awards from the submissions topped \$983,427! That is nearly three times the award money in nearly half the time. Coughlin Manuscript to Appear in *American Journal of Epidemiology*

Dr. Steven Coughlin, associate professor of Public Health, will have his manuscript titled “Reproducing Epidemiologic Research and Ensuring Transparency” published in the *American Journal of Epidemiology*. The manuscript discusses measures for ensuring the reproducibility of epidemiologic studies. Suggested measures include “making data sets and software available to other researchers to verify published findings, conduct alternative analyses of the data, and check for statistical errors or programming errors.” The *American Journal of Epidemiology* is the oldest epidemiologic journal and has an impact score of 5.230.

Coughlin and Research Team Work to Prevent Breast Cancer

Bolglia Produces Interactive iBook and Receives Grant

Dr. Lori Bolglia, Associate Professor of Physical Therapy, has been working with Lynsey Ekema in the Department of Instructional Design and Development on releasing an iBook titled “Extremities Alive”. The iBook, designed for students and clinicians, provides an interactive approach to studying joint movement and muscle function. In addition to releasing the iBook, Dr. Bolglia was recently awarded a \$1,800 research grant from the Southeast Athletic Trainers’ Association. With the help of PhD Student Lisa Cummins, Bolglia will explore the use of smartphone technology to measure hip and knee kinematics during a single-leg squat. The study will also determine associations between a) trunk endurance; b) hip and knee isometric strength; and c) trunk, hip, and knee neuromuscular activity with hip adduction and knee valgus during a single-leg squat. This is a novel new approach to examining these parameters during a single-leg squat and can lead to the development and implementation of new intervention strategies.

OT Faculty and Students Present at National Conference

A number of OT faculty and students are presenting at the annual American Occupational Therapy Association Conference in Philadelphia this week. They will present on topics ranging from the use of 3D animation and 3D printed models in learning outcomes to Equality in Healthcare: Fostering Inclusive Environments for the LGBTQ Community. They will also share their experiences with Camp IVEY and international field work. We know you are representing us well.

Benevides Completes Fellowship Program and Prepares to Present

Researcher Receives Gift for Stroke Research

Dr. Nasrul Hoda, Assistant Professor of Clinical Laboratory Sciences, received a \$20,000 gift from NeuroFX to continue stroke research. Dr. Hoda’s research was originally funded with an SBIR/R43 grant from NIH through NeuroFx to test and validate their product for stroke therapy. The Phase 1 grant was successfully completed on March 31st. NeuroFx liked the work done by our researchers and now interested to continue the collaboration and further extend this work to submit an SBIR Phase 2 application this year. The product from NeuroFx is Adipose Stem Cell Conditioned Media (ASCM), a cocktail of factors released from stem cells. It is believed that these factors will work better as therapy than the stem cell itself. Their generous gift will support the extension of the work.

Students Propose Apps for Neuromuscular Disease

Dr. Charlotte Chatto, Interim Director of the Physical Therapy program, designed a unique course that culminates with students proposing apps for development. As part of the last patient content area in the course, *Integration for Practice: Neuromuscular*, students examine a volunteer with a specific progressive neuromuscular disease, such as Parkinson's Disease or Multiple Sclerosis. As part of the project, they will create a concept for an app that will be of service to either the patient, caregiver, or physical therapist treating a patient of this population. This curriculum is innovative and challenges our students to meet the needs of their patients and caregivers. It also pushes our students to think about how technology can improve patient outcomes.

The CAHS budget is balanced and healthy: We generate more tuition revenue than ever before

As we approach the end of the fiscal year it is noteworthy that in FY17 our enrollment and tuition generation reached record highs. Since FY12 our enrollment increased from 512 to 761 in FY17. This increase is due in part to the reallocation of pre-health majors but will remain steady with the launch of the BSHS in the fall. Even before the reallocation, our added enrollment was up by 115 between FY12 and FY16, generating an estimated additional \$1.8M in tuition and fees for the university. Please note additional tuition revenue does not equal additional budget allocation for our college. On the spending side, the good news is that we always carefully balance the CAHS budget allocation received and the CAHS expenditures. As a result, our College budget was balanced last year, it is projected balanced this fiscal year and we presented a balanced plan for next year. In addition to recognizing our faculty members for the accomplishments, let me use this opportunity to highlight the role of our Business Office/Aubre Keenan and our Departmental Office Managers. Please stop by their office and thank them for the hard work and dedication!

Dear Colleagues,

For six years, it has been my tremendous opportunity and privilege to serve as Dean of the College of Allied Health Sciences at Augusta University. With the conclusion of my leadership service as Dean August 11, 2017, I would like to reach out to you and express appreciation for the remarkable teamwork.

- In 2011, the college had 516 enrolled students and last year we had 631 students, a 22% increase. With the latest re-allocation of pre-health students, our College has an additional 26% enrollment increase this year. Our educational programs are 100% accredited and the retention rate is 93%.
- The College of Allied Health Sciences graduated the most students in the May commencement. The additional CAHS enrollment brings millions of dollars of additional tuition revenue to the University. Our growth was realized during the time of greatest enrollment challenges at our University.

- We successfully launched new educational programs. The PhD in Applied Health Sciences program was developed in response to faculty shortages. The nutrition program started with an MOU transferring it from University Health System. Our new Bachelor of Science in Health Services (BSHS) undergraduate program provided the perfectly timed response to the USG mandate for pre-health studies. We greatly expanded Master of Public Health (MPH) program.
- Six years ago, there were 2 principal investigators with larger than \$50,000 in external funding. Today we have 10 such PIs including NIH R01 grants, DOD grant, VA Merit Award, PCORI funded project, RWJ funded project and many other important and exciting projects. Our research attracts millions of dollars in extramural funding and also provides important support for the educational mission of the College.
- Our budgetary challenges were sometimes significant, but I am proud that working with faculty colleagues, we pulled people together and got the job done. This year our Faculty Practice Plan has the highest level of revenues and also reserves in its history.

Many achievements of the teamwork cannot be expressed in numbers but your dedication to quality education has always been a source of great inspiration for our students and also for me as your Dean. As I am returning to the tenured faculty role, let me reiterate my gratitude and request your support for the incoming new leadership.

Provost Caughman asked me to add the following comment: "I want to take this opportunity to thank Dean Balas, on behalf of Augusta University as well as personally, for his leadership of the College of Allied Health Sciences, and to congratulate the College for its outstanding accomplishments over the past six years. The College, with its excellent faculty, staff and students, is a critical component of our University, and I look forward to more great things in its future."
