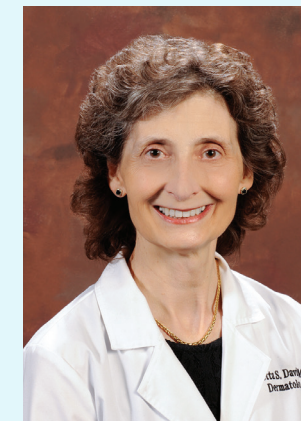
## From the Chair

Specifically, we deliberated on key topics such as certification of need (CON) policies, non-compete clauses in physician contracts, and rising scope of practice issues.

After discussion, each participant voted on the specific policies/stance that MAG then adopted as their official platform. MAG representatives will now take this platform to our lobbyists at the state capitol as well as to the larger body of the American Medical Association (AMA). It was very exciting to be part of this process and to hear doctors (some of whom are members of congress) from all specialties in both private and academic practice advocate for our profession. This meeting got me excited to advocate more for physicians within politics and I have since also attended the more locally based Richmond County Medical Society meeting and will try to participate in "doctor's day" at the state capitol next year.

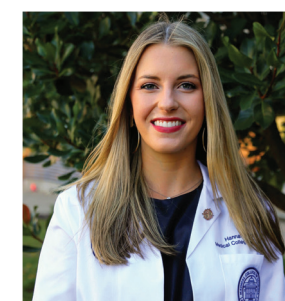
"I had the great opportunity to attend the AADA Legislative Conference in Washington DC as the resident representative for the Georgia Society of Dermatology and Dermatologic Surgery. This annual meeting educates dermatologists on the most pressing pieces of legislation affecting the specialty and then allows for advocating to our local representatives. This year, the two bills we were advocating for were the Strengthening Medicare for Patients and Providers Act, which aims to tie physician Medicare compensation to an inflationary factor, as well as the Safe Step Act, which hopes to eliminate unnecessary step therapy mandated by insurance companies when attempting to escalate therapy for patients. I had the privilege of meeting with the offices of both Senator Warnock and Ossoff, as well as six House of Representative members across Georgia, to discuss our stance and ask for their support in these two pieces of legislation."

## CONVERGE Grant

The Converge International Rural Health Symposium is a multidisciplinary conference created to promote joint research in rural health care between The University of Aberdeen in Scotland and Augusta University. This year, Kendall Buchanan, MD, an Assistant Professor in our dermatology department, and Peter Murchie, MD, a Professor of Primary Care at the University of Aberdeen, received 1 of 4 \$10,000 Converge grants.

The project, 'Using app-based digital healthcare intervention to encourage total skin self-examination by melanoma survivors, is a collaborative effort between our department, the Georgia Cancer Center, and The University of Aberdeen, and is based on integration of the ASICA model (Achieving Self-directed Integrated Cancer Aftercare) to help serve our rural patients. ASICA focuses on piloting a smart phone app that prompts monthly total self-skin exams (TSSEs) in rural melanoma survivors to decrease the financial and travel burden for these patients. Participants receive monthly reminders through the app to conduct their TSSEs and are prompted to contact the dermatology office if a new or changing lesion develops. The app was previously piloted in Aberdeen and successfully detected 3 melanoma recurrences, 1 primary melanoma, 1 basal cell carcinoma, and 2 dysplastic nevi while also increasing compliance, confidence, skills, and intention to complete TSSEs. The project aims to enroll 40 rural melanoma survivors to use the app monthly for a 6-month period.

Dr. Buchanan and Dr. Murchie credit the detailed project infrastructure and successful IRB approval to Hannah Myers, a third-year MCG student who was recently awarded a scholarship for her work on this project. The enrollment process will likely commence in January 2024.

**Out with the Old & In with the New**  
It is with mixed emotions that we say farewell to the "Octopus," the 14 head microscope that many of you huddled over in your efforts to master dermatopathology! This instrument has served us well over the past 30+ years but has health issues that cannot be rectified.
