appointment in Physiology and Dermatology and has contributed extensively to the success of the University and our Department. We are so privileged to partner with her.

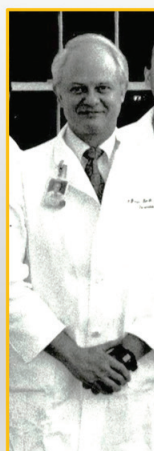

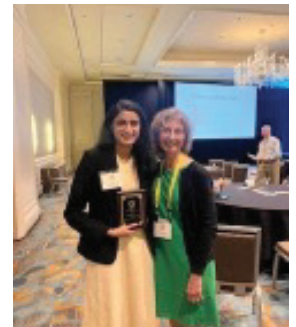

## 2025 MCG ALUMNI ASSOCIATION'S DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS

### Kim Yancey, MD

When Dr. Kim Yancey was an MCG Dermatology Resident, Drs. Ski Smith and Don Abele recognized his potential to be a "triple threat," a term used for academicians who stand out for amazingly strong research, leadership and teaching skills. With the blessing and encouragement of our founding Chairs, Dr. Yancey left our dermatology residency a year early to move onto the National Institute of Health. Kim took his MCG roots to the NIH and from there his distinguished career flourished.

After becoming a medical staff fellow in the Dermatology Branch of the National Cancer Institute, he eventually became a Senior Investigator running his own lab. Along the way he was Acting Chairman of the Department of Dermatology at the Uniformed Services University of Health Sciences in Bethesda. He later became Chair of the Department of Dermatology at the Medical College of Wisconsin and then found his long-term home as Chair of Dermatology at the University of Texas Southwestern. He continues his illustrious career at that institution which in dermatology circles is one of the best of the best.



Dr. Yancey has held numerous national leadership positions including Director and Vice President of the American Board of Dermatology, Deputy Editor of the Journal of Investigative Dermatology, President of the Society for Investigative Dermatology, President of the Dermatology Foundation and member of the Board of Directors of the Association of Professors of Dermatology. He has had funded research support from the NIH for over 25 years and currently serves on the National Institute of Arthritis, Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases Board of Scientific Counselors. He has held membership on numerous editorial boards, given named lectureships around the country and globe, and published in robust fashion. His honors include the Distinguished Service award and the Marion Sulzberger Award from the American Board of Dermatology, the Founders Award from the American Skin Association, and the Stephen Rothman Award from the Society for Investigative Dermatology, among numerous others. Eight years ago, MCG Dermatology hosted the Southeastern Consortium for Dermatology. When asked who we would invite to be our keynote speaker, Dr. Kim Yancey was our obvious choice.

Dr. Yancey has represented his alma mater and our residency program in outstanding fashion. In recognition of his countless accomplishments the Medical College of Georgia Alumni Association presented him with the 2025 MCG Alumni Association's Distinguished Alumnus Award for Professional Achievement. We are so proud!
